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NEWS REPORT JULY 2022

Monthly Highlights

We are still seeking sponsors to support families and individuals fleeing the war in Ukraine. One of the primary requirements is for accommodation to host those whose initial sponsorship didn't work out for a variety of reasons. There might also be people who signed up at that time and were not matched with refugees, and we'd like to hear from any who would still like to do their bit.

Highways has decided to reduce the speed limit to 50mph along the A428 from the Lakeside roundabout through to the county boundary. I have arranged a meeting with WNC Highways engineers on 8 July to better understand the impact of the solution on the A428. This is an important first step in seeking to improve the highway safety of the A428, and I look forward to continuing this conversation in the months ahead.

I visited the Mud Kitchen Café's monthly farmers' market and craft fair at Cogenhoe and Whiston Village Hall on Sunday 12 June 2022. They had a good range of stalls plus a good range of fresh vegetables too. It is becoming a very popular event. Do try to come along to the next one on Sunday 10 July 2022 from 10am to 3pm.

Dawn Allingham, Deputy Chairman of the Brafield Parish Council said a few kind words of introduction and Tessa did the honours.

I was honoured, to be invited by the Churchwardens to the Service of Thanksgiving for the Refurbishment of the interior and the Dedication of the New Life Window at the Church of St Mary the Virgin, Little Houghton on 19 June.

I had a busy schedule of events in Hackleton and Grange Park over the Jubilee Bank Holiday weekend. I tried to make an event in each Parish across the Ward. I used my Councillor Covid Fund to support three events, which were Jubilee related and I have shared details of the events I attended in this monthly report. Well done to all of the Platinum Jubilee Committees for working so hard and making the Jubilee Celebration such a success.

Examination of the Northampton Local Plan Part 2 continues as we prepare for a six-week public consultation on proposed changes. The Northampton Local Plan Part 2 is a major planning policy document that will help guide planning decisions throughout Northampton up to 2029. Following public hearings in November 2021, the Examiner appointed by the Planning Inspectorate has called for some changes, or modifications, before the Plan can be adopted by WNC. A consultation on those changes will start next month. A Part 2 Local Plan for the Daventry Area was adopted in February 2020, while the Part 2 Local Plan for the South Northants Area was adopted in July the same year.

The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) has a new online event on giving local (parish and town) councils more of a say on housing, taking place on 27 July 2022. According to research undertaken by the

National Housing Federation and the homelessness charity Crisis, 340,000 new homes a year need to be built in England until 2031 to address the current housing backlog and future demand.

The deadline for people to have their say on proposals for a new 50-place SEND (special educational needs and disabilities) unit at Hunsbury Park Primary School has been extended. A four-week consultation began in May, but has now been extended to 23 June, to allow more people to comment. After the consultation, responses will be analysed and presented to the WNC Cabinet for a final decision. The move is part of a larger strategy to create 500 new specialist places by 2024 and will see work take place over the summer ready for the new intake of pupils in September this year.

With a forecast of a 25 percent increase in the number of children needing specialist education by 2025, we are proposing that a new special free school should open providing up to 250 specialist places from September 2024. Under the free school 'presumption' route, the local authority (WNC in this instance) is responsible for funding the Proposed New School and providing a suitable site. WNC has identified land on St. John's Road, Tiffield, near Towcester.

Services helping domestic abuse victims find safer accommodation across Northamptonshire will receive extra funding of over £273,000 this year. Our Council, in partnership with North Northamptonshire Council, have set out plans to boost the funding provided to the Northamptonshire Domestic Abuse Service (NDAS) and Eve Domestic Violence & Abuse support services.

Anglian Water is offering a range of practical support for residents experiencing difficulty with their bills, and we are being encouraged to share information about the help that is available. The range of financial assistance available includes discounted tariffs, assistance schemes for those who have fallen behind on payments, as well as flexible and affordable payment plans.

WNC has been allocated £5.4million from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF). This is the largest amount to be given to a single council across the whole of the South East Midlands, and council colleagues have already begun work to explore how best to use it in order to maximise the benefit for our communities.

Northamptonshire Community Foundation is working with West Northamptonshire Council to help coordinate the distribution of up to 8,500 food vouchers (value of £100) to financially vulnerable residents across the locality of West Northamptonshire between July and September 2022 through local community groups and charities working with residents most in need. This is part of a second phase of the Household Support Fund; £421 million has been made available to County Councils and Unitary Authorities in England to support those most in need to help with significantly rising living costs.

The deadline for applications to the Kick Start Fund is Friday 15 July, so please help encourage fledgling businesses to come forward.

A new £3 million fund to upgrade and renovate England's village halls has been announced by the Government to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Over a three-year period, the Platinum Jubilee Village Hall Improvement Grant Fund will provide money for projects such as installing Wi-Fi, extending buildings and modernising facilities. A total of 125 village halls will receive money from the fund.

A derelict supermarket will be demolished in a £785,000 project, which will see 80 new parking spaces created to serve Towcester town centre. The supermarket in the Sponne Arcade, which included 70

parking spaces, has stood empty since September 2018 and fell into disrepair before being bought by South Northamptonshire Council in July 2020.

On 1 June 2022, West Northamptonshire Council announced Kier as its preferred contractor to deliver a new highways service with increased investment this autumn. The announcement was the outcome of an 18-month competitive process to award a new maintenance contract as part of the £30m-a-year service, which includes maintaining local roads, footpaths, signage and drainage, repairing potholes and winter gritting.

Highways has advised me that the 3472 Billing Causeway No 5 repairs are programmed to start on the 27th of June. These works will include the reconstruction of the damaged parapet and other associated works. These works will improve the structural stability of the bridge and improve the safety for road users. The bridge will be reinstated as per the original design and all blocks and barriers will be removed at the completion of the works.

Mark Jones, Chief Fire Officer of the South Australian Country Fire Service has been chosen as Northamptonshire's next Chief Fire Officer. His appointment is now subject to confirmation by the Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Panel, which will take place in the next few weeks. If Mark is confirmed as the next Chief Fire Officer, he will take over the reins when Darren Dovey retires from the post in October this year.

Contractor On Track has made great progress on the new Northampton Bike Park as we reach the halfway point of the build. The £725k project will deliver a range of facilities for all ranges of ability, from a skills area usable by children on balance bikes, right up to the most demanding trails for experts in the sport, all of them free to use

Meeting with Highways to discuss reduction in A428 speed limit

The Speed Limit Review Panel has now had the opportunity to consider my request for a 40mph limit on the A428 at Denton. Following extensive discussion via the Speed Limit Review Panel and the Red Route



Group and following analysis of all the information available to us it has been decided to reduce the speed limit to 50mph along the A428 from the Lakeside roundabout through to the county boundary. There is a chance that this could extend all along the A428 into Milton Keynes, our Road Safety Manager is currently in dialogue with Milton Keynes Council. It was determined that a reduced limit of 50mph for the whole length of the route would be more suitable than a short section of 40mph surrounded by sections of derestricted limits which can lead to driver confusion. This will now be passed over to our engineers who will progress this through the legal process, which needs to be

followed prior to the limit being changed on site. I have shared the information with Denton and Brafield Parish Councils, who were pleased to hear that action was being taken. I have raised a number of queries with Highways and requested the evidence that underpins their proposal, so that I can understand the basis for the recommendation. I have arranged a meeting with WNC Highways engineers on 8 July to

better understand the impact of the solution on the A428. This is an important first step in seeking to improve the highway safety of the A428, and

Cogenhoe & Whiston Parish Help Desk

The parish helpdesk is a facility Cogenhoe & Whiston Parish Council introduced for its residents. It has been running at the Mud Kitchen Café in the Village Hall since last October and is open from 11-12pm every Thursday morning. It was introduced to help residents who do not have any Internet access and to provide a more local, personal service to access Council services.

The Parish Council has been working hard on community outreach post-pandemic and this facility forms part of that outreach and finding better ways to serve residents.

The parish helpdesk from the café in the Village Hall offers prescription collections from the local surgery in Denton and the opportunity just to have a chat and cup of coffee, which really helps with resident's well-being, especially those on their own. It is run by the Parish Council's clerk Deborah Rush and is mostly used by older residents. I often use the cafe for casework and chat to residents who pop in. Deborah goes the extra mile with this service for the local residents.

Lepidopterology in Denton

On Saturday 4 June 2022, whilst waiting for the judging of the Denton Bake off and the children arriving for their Treasure Hunt, I was treated to an impromptu discussion with Peter Terry at St Margaret's Church. I had great fun looking at his moth samples and finding out about how and why he studies moths. The numbers of Butterflies and Moths are highly sensitive indicators of the health of the environment and play a crucial role in the food chain as well as





being pollinators of

plants. The UK has 59 species of butterflies – 57 resident species of butterflies and two regular migrants – the Painted Lady and Clouded Yellow. Compared to this, there are 2,500 species of moth found in the UK.

I had no idea that there were so many moths. Peter told us all about how he created Moth traps and how moths differ from butterflies in a few ways. Most people think moths are nocturnal and brown and butterflies are diurnal and colourful. While this is generally true, it isn't a tried-andtrue method of moth identification. There are some stunningly beautiful moth species that fly during the day!

He showed us several different moths that he had caught locally including one that resembled the cut off part of a branch of a tree.

time of the original appeal, who might now be able to help. There might also be people who signed up at that time and were not matched with refugees, and we'd like to hear from any who would still like to do their bit.

West Northamptonshire is an incredibly welcoming place, with many wonderful people who are willing to support those in need. We're extremely grateful for all the help so far, yet we could do with some additional help. The £350 per month thank-you payment is still on offer for sponsors who are successfully matched to Ukrainian guests.

We need some basic information to begin the process including:

- Name, address and contact details
- Who they would be able to accommodate (a family with children/couple/single female/single male)
- What accommodation they have available (including size and number of bedrooms)
- An indication of whether you have already registered your interest in becoming a sponsor on the government website.

Visas and Arrivals for Ukraine, latest regional data

Refugee Week 20-26 June 2022



West Northants will celebrate Refugee Week from 20 June 2022 with a few events to raise awareness of issues affecting asylum seekers and the local support available to them. Throughout the week of 20 to 26 June, events will take place at the University of Northampton, Delapre Abbey and online, with a full programme of speakers and presentations also planned at the Guildhall on Thursday, 23 June. The activities will showcase all the support available to

refugees in West Northamptonshire, whose communities have welcomed hundreds of individuals and families fleeing persecution from places including the Ukraine, Afghanistan and Syria. Recent resettlement schemes have included supporting the arrival and community care needs of nearly 400 Afghan nationals

and more than 290 local people coming forward as sponsors for Ukrainian families as part of the Homes for Ukraine scheme.

West Northamptonshire Council's (WNC) Diverse Communities Forum will be hosting the event in the Guildhall alongside Town of Sanctuary, from 4pm to 6pm, with stalls from organisations including Red Cross, DWP and Quakers.

There will also be a short film and a photo exhibition from L2L during the event and presentations and stories from refugees that have settled in Northants.

Refugee Week is a UK-wide festival celebrating the contributions, creativity and resilience of refugees and people seeking sanctuary. Founded in 1998 and held every year around World Refugee Day on the 20 June.

Progress continues on £150 Energy Rebate

Work on distributing £150 Council Tax energy rebates across West Northamptonshire is making good progress. The rebate, which is being paid to help with the rise in the cost of living, applies to around 143,000 homes in Council Tax Bands A to D across the area and the sum will not need to be repaid.



The majority of those who pay their Council Tax by direct debit should have now received the rebate and this week West Northamptonshire Council is writing to the remaining 42,000 homes who do not pay by direct debit encouraging them to confirm their bank details so payment can be made. The letter will include a unique passcode enabling residents to apply online, plus a paper application for those residents unable to access the internet.

We are only too aware of the cost-of-living increases people are facing. And our Revenue and Benefits Service has worked tirelessly to put new processes in place to distribute payments as quickly as possible.

The Government stipulation is that councils need to make a payment rather than simply crediting Council Tax accounts, which has resulted in both significant additional work for our staff and the need for changes to our IT systems.

To ensure that all eligible residents receive the rebate, any residents that have not made an application, online or by post, by 31 July 2022 and for whom bank account details are not known will have their Council Tax account credited with the £150 payment. Our Trading Standards team is joining forces with others across the East Midlands to promote 'Operation June' which aims to raise awareness about the additional dangers associated with illegal cigarettes.

The campaign was launched following the death ten years ago of 71-year-old Lincolnshire resident June Buffham, who lost her life in a house fire caused by an illegal unsafe cigarette. In Northamptonshire, three people have died as a result of smoking related fires in the last four years. Any cigarette could cause a house fire, but genuine cigarettes are designed to extinguish if not actively smoked. Fake or smuggled cigarettes may


not. In a recent prosecution by our Trading Standards team, the owner of UK Monopol in Northampton was fined a total of £6,577 for selling counterfeit and smuggled cigarettes, some of which failed to comply with safety tests. During the campaign the Trading Standards team is encouraging people to report the sale of illegal cigarettes to them via the Citizens Advice Consumer Service on 0808 223 1133.

Pest Control Bees or Wasps

Our pest control officers are typically kept busy at this time of year dealing with unwanted wasps nests.

But things may not always be as they seem - what may look like wasps are often bees instead.

We do not offer treatments for bee swarms but instead urge people to contact the Northamptonshire Beekeepers'

Northampton Local Plan Part 2 Modifications

Examination of the Northampton Local Plan Part 2 continues as West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) prepares for a six-week public consultation on proposed modifications. The Local Plan Part 2 is a major planning policy document that will help guide planning decisions throughout Northampton up to 2029. Following public hearings in November 2021, the Government appointed Planning Inspectors have

recommended some modifications, before the Plan can be adopted by WNC. A consultation on those modifications will start next month if the Planning Policy Committee on 28 June 2022 approves this next step.

Only comments on the modifications to the Local Plan Part 2 and the associated Sustainability Appraisal and Habitats Regulations Assessments can be considered. The modifications comprise:

- Main modifications These are required to make the plan 'sound'. They involve changes or insertions to policies and text that are essential to enable the plan to be adopted. Any comments on these will be considered by the Planning Inspectors.
- Additional Modifications these are spelling, grammar, presentational changes and comments which will be considered by WNC. These do not affect the soundness of the plan.
- Changes to the maps alterations including boundary changes and deallocations which will also be considered by WNC. These do not affect the soundness of the plan

The Local Plan Part 2 is a major piece of work which started in May 2016 and is now nearing its final stages. For more information on the examination process, visit - <u>https://www.northampton.gov.uk/info/200205/planning-for-the-future/2553/northampton-local-plan-part-2-submission</u>.

A Part 2 Local Plan for the Daventry Area was adopted in February 2020, while the Part 2 Local Plan for the South Northants Area was adopted in July the same year.

Enforcement Officers will issue a £75 fixed penalty notice to anyone caught disposing of their litter irresponsibly. Failure to pay the £75 penalty can lead to a court imposed fine of up to £2,500.

If you have accepted responsibility and been issued with a fixed penalty notice, you'll have 14 days to pay it. The penalty notice will be reduced to £50 if paid within seven days.

What are the top three Priorities for Rural Areas

A large proportion of the West Northamptonshire area is comprised of rural settlements, which account for approximately one third of the area's population. This is particularly the case in the districts of South Northamptonshire and Daventry where the percentage of people living in rural communities is as high as 75%.

The West Northamptonshire Joint Core Strategy prepared by the WNJPU had the following top three priorities for the rural areas:

- 1. To meet communities' needs locally,
- 2. To protect and enhance the environmental heritage; and
- 3. To protect and enhance the built environment.

Are these still our top three priorities?

New Research says 12 million people are side-lined

If England's rural communities were a distinct region, their need for

Levelling Up would be greater than that of any other part of the country, according to new research published 20 June 2022 that finds the Government's metrics do not properly account for the pressures facing our smaller towns and villages and as a result effectively side-line 12 million people. The report, *Rural as a region: the hidden challenge for Levelling Up*, finds that the Government's Levelling Up white paper metrics - used to identify the region's most in need of levelling up - are too urban-focused, and do not account for disadvantage in rural economies within regions, often linked to limited local employment prospects, poor transport networks and weak connectivity. It calls for the Government to rethink its choice of metrics and include more rural-relevant indicators such as work placed based incomes, fuel poverty levels, access to further education and house prices relative to local earnings. The research, authored by economists from Pragmatix Advisory, sets out that despite being home to a fifth of the population and with a larger total population than London or the South East, when evaluating all the headline metrics in the white paper against the other nine geographies, England's 'hidden region' has a greater need to be levelled up than any other part of the country.



The White Paper, published earlier this year, identified four high-level objectives and 12 missions to level up communities by 2030, setting out metrics to evaluate need and monitor progress. However, the report by Pragmatix Advisory for the Rural Services Network, which represents rural councils, warns that the metrics and measures are too focused on discrete regions, with limited reference to more spread-out rural communities. Metrics also do not account for key discrepancies such as frequency of public transport services to access key services, house price to local earnings ratio or percentage of premises with super-fast broadband. Pragmatix Advisory has set out a range of additional metrics that could be used to supplement those already in the white paper, which would better identify those areas most in need of levelling up at a

local level and help Government achieve its levelling up objectives. These include:

- Proportion of households in fuel poverty
- Work place-based incomes
- House price relative to local earnings
- Ratio, and rates of seasonal employment
- Frequency of public transport services to access key services
- Distance to Further Education provider and the range of courses available
- Referral for treatment waiting times, rates of delayed discharge and levels of self-harm amongst younger people
- Percentage of premises with super-fast broadband

Rebecca Munro, consultant, Pragmatix Advisory, states:

"The Levelling Up agenda cannot include every metric, and the ones that have been outlined in the white paper are important to meeting government's objectives, but without considering additional metrics, there is a risk that the needs of 12 million rural residents could be ignored."

Graham Biggs, Chief Executive of the Rural Services Network, comments:

"Rural areas would be better represented as a part of the levelling up agenda by the inclusion of additional metrics which demonstrate some of the underlying causes of disadvantage. Without taking these into account, levelling up support may end up widening the gap between rural communities and their urban counterparts. The Government's levelling up objectives will not be met if it further increases the gap between areas within the region."



A Level 2 Heat Alert 16-18 June

A Level 2 Heat-Health alert came into force from midnight Thursday 16 June lasting until midnight on Saturday 18 June, even overnight temperatures were predicted to be unseasonably warm. High temperatures unfortunately come with health





consequences for some people so we're asking you please keep an eye on those most vulnerable, particularly those who are older or have lung or heart conditions. Look out for signs of Heat exhaustion and heatstroke - NHS (www.nhs.uk) and follow some common sense behaviours to make the most of what should be a glorious time for most.

Here are our top tips for staying safe in the heat:

- 3. Look out for those who may struggle to keep themselves cool and hydrated
- 4. Stay hydrated, take water with you if you are travelling or out and about
- 5. Stay out of the sun between 11am and 3pm as this is when UV rays are the strongest avoid physical exertion at this time
- 6. If you have to go out in the heat stay in the shade, apply sunscreen and wear a wide brimmed hat
- 7. Close curtains in rooms that the sun faces this will help rooms remain cooler remember it could be cooler outdoors than indoors
- 8. Never leave anyone in a parked closed vehicle especially not animals, children or babies

9. Avoid travelling at peak times on motorways, particularly if transporting children or the elderly Sadly accidents, often fatal, happen in water at this time of year particularly involving youngsters. That's why we're asking parents to supervise their children in and around water. Although it can be fun to cool off in water structures such as bridges, locks and flood channels, and reservoirs should be avoided. Independent Analysis of Social Care Charging Reforms

The report, released today by the County Councils Network (CCN) and Newton, provides the first independent analysis of the government's flagship social care charging reforms. Key findings from the



report include:

The cost of the care reforms for over 65s in England could cost a minimum of £25.5bn over the next decade from when they are introduced in October 2023. This compares to the government's estimate of £15.6bn. Newton's analysis suggests that more people will benefit from the means-test and cap on care, meaning the costs of these two elements of reform alone are £2.5bn higher than the government's estimate. There is significant regional variation in the costs of implementing

the reforms, with councils in county and rural areas disproportionally affected. CCN's member councils account for 57% (£14.4bn) of the total costs of the reforms - at a minimum estimate. Unless government changes the way it distributes adult social care funding between councils, county areas face a shortfall of £7.6bn when funding for these reforms is distributed.

An additional 4,300 extra social workers could be required to carry out extra care assessments, which determine the level of support individuals are eligible to receive. In addition, around 700 extra financial assessors will also be required to carry out financial assessments after the care assessment stage - if no changes to existing ways of working are made. Around 3,000 of these staff could be required in areas covered by CCN's member councils - 60% of all extra recruitment.

Commitment to Helping Domestic Abuse Victims

Services helping domestic abuse victims find safer accommodation across Northamptonshire will receive



extra funding of over £273,000 this year. Our Council, in partnership with North Northamptonshire Council, have set out plans to boost the funding provided to the Northamptonshire Domestic Abuse Service (NDAS) and Eve Domestic Violence & Abuse support services. It means the two organisations will share in total just over £700,000 in 2022/23 to help them meet an increasing demand for services. It also ensures that grant funding to NDAS for their Specialist Drug and Alcohol Refuge continues.

The funding is distributed by the two councils, from the Government's Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities. The move reaffirms our councils' commitment to supporting victims of domestic

abuse and moving forward the actions of the countywide Domestic Abuse Strategy for 2022-25. Find out more about the Strategy on our website.

Keep Safe Scheme

Have you heard about the Keep Safe Card scheme? The Keep Safe Card is for anyone in Northamptonshire with a learning disability, dementia, Alzheimer's disease, or any other disability that could make them vulnerable when out and about.

50 New Specialist Places at Hunsbury Park Primary School

The deadline for people to have their say on proposals for a new 50-place SEND (special educational needs and disabilities) unit at Hunsbury Park Primary School has been extended.

The school already successfully operates a smaller SEND unit, and its senior leadership contains significant experience of working within specialist settings. The greatest amount of current and future demand for SEND places in West Northants arises from Northampton, so the school is ideally placed, as well as being more easily accessible for residents in the South Northants area. If approved, it could see work take place



over the summer ready for the new intake of pupils in September.

A four-week consultation began in May, but has now been extended to 23 June, to allow more people to comment. After the



consultation, responses will be analysed and presented to the WNC Cabinet for a final decision in July.

will also see the establishment of 259 places within SEND units attached to mainstream schools and extensions to existing special schools located within West Northants. The publication of the Proposed New Designated Free Special School Specification follows the start of the 'free school presumption' process in May 2022 during which the council gained broad support for the new school from the special education sector in the region.

Young People Leaving Care

A new protocol for supporting young people leaving care is in place thanks to a partnership effort. It has been developed by our Housing and Communities team, together with North Northamptonshire Council and Northamptonshire Children's Trust (NCT), and is a great example of how our Council is bringing agencies together in order to improve services for our communities.



Under the new protocol, a new Care Leavers Transitions Accommodation Panel chaired by the service or strategic manager for the NCT Leaving Care service, meets monthly to consider cases. Its membership is varied, to ensure that all services and partners are

working together as the 'corporate parent' of young people leaving care.

The panel brings together representatives from a range of teams within our council - including housing, adult services and education – together with partners including the Youth Offending Service, health, and the police. Its objectives are to:

- Bring housing, health, social care, and all partners together to jointly plan early transitions with young people in care and preparing to leave care
- Support each other and the young person in making plans
- Improve the timeliness and breadth of accommodation, support & care planning

- Ensure Pathway Plans include support and accommodation services available from partners to meet all the assessed needs of the young person
- Create shared risk management plans for young people believed to be at risk of harm or exploitation.

Panels are held on the first Thursday of each month, with the first held in May.

WNC allocated £5.4m from UK Prosperity Fund

WNC has been allocated £5.4million from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF). This is the largest amount to be given to a single council across the whole of the South East Midlands, and council colleagues have already begun work to explore how best to use it in order to maximise the benefit for our communities. The UKSPF is a central pillar of the UK government's ambitious Levelling Up agenda, and a significant component of its support for places across the UK. It will provide £2.6 billion of new funding for local investment by March 2025.

With very strict criteria for applications, the aim of the Fund is to empower local leaders and communities to increase people's pride in the places they love, creating a stronger social fabric and better life chances. An Investment Plan detailing how we intend to use the funding to target these priorities must be



submitted to the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities by 1 August. Whilst this Fund has only just been announced, Council officers are proactively preparing our Investment Plan, and will be working with all the necessary stakeholders in order to understand the needs of the area and develop an effective plan.

Household Support Fund Proposal

At West Northamptonshire Council's (WNC) Cabinet Meeting on14 June, councillors agreed how to best use



the Household Support fund within the scope set out by government ministers. Previous funding has supported households with food, energy and water costs, and this extension will ensure that this support continues through to the end of September.

The £2,599,628 from the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) will be distributed by WNC and is earmarked to target the most vulnerable households and individuals in the area.

A third of the funding is ring-fenced to support families with children, while another third is firmly dedicated to pensioners.

This ensures the people who need it most will continue to receive vital support to meet essential household costs. WNC will work with more than 30 local voluntary and community groups and organisations to ensure the remaining third of the funding goes to those households in severe financial hardship and most need of help towards significantly rising living costs.

The money will be distributed, via various packages, to families and individuals in specific financial hardship over the course of the summer period.

Families who are eligible for free school meals are set to receive £20 per week food vouchers during the summer holiday and eligible households suffering severe financial hardship will get a £100 food voucher in a bid to offset the recent increases in food and fuel costs. Over 6,500 pensioners receiving Pension Credit will also receive £100, with an additional Pension Credit Top Up of £50 for pensioners with severe disabilities.

The second allocation of the government's Household Support Fund will be shared as follows:

£20 per week food vouchers to go to 10,530 children, the intention being to cover the holiday period for children on school meals. School meal payments are expected to be made direct to parents via the schools a couple of weeks before the start of the holidays. £100 payment voucher for 6,500 residents who receive Pension Credit. Residents do not need to apply for this and will be advised by post during July using the Pension Credit system.

Pension Credit Top Up for pensioners with severe disabilities - £50 payment for each registered recipient of this benefit. There is also no need to apply for this and those eligible will be advised by post in July using the Pension Credit system.

The Council will partner up with over 30 local voluntary and community organisations to distribute approximately £865,000 of hardship payments to the most vulnerable households across West Northamptonshire this summer, as part of a wider approach to support communities with the cost of living crisis.

Work is currently taking place to shape arrangements with the community and voluntary sector, and residents are encouraged to look out for further information in the coming weeks.

Local Charities to apply to distribute Food Vouchers

Northamptonshire Community Foundation is working with West Northamptonshire Council to help coordinate the distribution of up to 8,500 food vouchers (value of £100) to financially vulnerable residents across the locality of West Northamptonshire between July and September 2022 through local community



groups and charities working with residents most in need. This is part of a second phase of the Household Support Fund; £421 million has been made available to County Councils and Unitary Authorities in England to support those most in need to help with significantly rising living costs. Platinum Jubilee Village Hall Improvement Grant Fund

A new £3 million fund to upgrade and renovate England's village halls has been announced by the Government to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Over a three-year period, the Platinum Jubilee Village



Hall Improvement Grant Fund will provide money for projects such as installing Wi-Fi, extending buildings and modernising facilities. The Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (Defra) said village halls are at the heart of rural life, hosting fitness classes, community groups and post office services, and the grant will allow them to attract more people by creating more contemporary spaces. A total of 125 village halls will receive money from the fund, which Defra said will be a "lasting legacy" from the Jubilee for rural communities. Rural affairs minister Lord Benyon said: "Village halls are the centrepiece of rural life and funding their renovation to mark the Jubilee is a fitting tribute to The Queen's Service. "In a changing world, they are important facilities for

community groups, social clubs and local services. "This funding will ensure they are central to the fabric of our villages for many more years to come." Defra said the grant will build on the success of schemes to commemorate both Queen Victoria and King George and "demonstrate that almost 200 years on, we continue to build on the legacy of the monarchy, both past and present".

Margaret Clark, chairwoman of the Rural Coalition, said: "Village halls support important services and facilities and offer places to meet which would not otherwise be available to many rural communities. "In doing so, they have a crucial role to play in helping levelling up in rural areas."

David Emerson, chairman of Action with Communities in Rural England said village halls have been at the heart of rural communities for over a century, adding: "These unique volunteer run halls do so much to support the well-being of local residents, as well as helping to sustain the many livelihoods which depend on use of these important buildings." He said the announcement "is especially appropriate in the week that thousands of halls across the country are hosting local celebrations of the Royal Jubilee".

Details on how the funding will be administered will be announced later.


A further 80 Car parking spaces in Towcester



A derelict supermarket will be demolished in a £785,000 project which will see 80 new parking spaces created to serve Towcester town centre. The supermarket in the Sponne Arcade, which included 70 parking spaces, has stood empty since September 2018 and fell into disrepair before being bought by South Northamptonshire Council in July 2020.

On Tuesday our Cabinet gave the go ahead for the demolition of the supermarket and the creation of a further 80 short stay parking spaces. The new car park will increase accessibility to

shops and services and will help future-proof the town centre for the growing population. In addition to the demolition, and expansion of the car park, the project will see the reconfiguration of the existing parking spaces to conform with modern standards.



The number of disabled and family parking spaces will be increased as part of the project, which also includes the provision to expand upon the existing electric charging points installed in 2021. Additional lighting, CCTV, landscaping, and work to walkways will also make the car park safer and more accessible. The work is expected to last for six-months during which time the car park will be closed for public use. We will continue to work with nearby businesses and residents to keep them fully informed of the project. Once

complete the short stay parking spaces will align with short stay restrictions elsewhere in the town: three hours free parking between 8am and 6pm, no return within three hours.

What to expect from new highways service from September

Cleaning road signs, removing vegetation, replacing worn road markings and providing better updates and information are among the improvement plans for the first few months of our new highways service when it launches this autumn. Under the new contract with Kier, West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) will deliver a brand new service with priorities and requirements specifically tailored to West Northamptonshire and a fresh flexibility to meet the changing priorities of the council and needs of its community.

Highways Maintenance Contract

On 1 June 2022, West Northamptonshire Council announced Kier as its preferred contractor to deliver a



new highways service with increased investment this autumn. The announcement was the outcome of an 18-month competitive process to award a new maintenance contract as part of the £30m-a-year service, which includes maintaining local roads, footpaths, signage and drainage, repairing potholes and winter gritting.

The current highways maintenance contract, currently delivered Northamptonshire-wide by Kier and WSP under arrangements inherited from the previous county council, was procured over a decade ago and since the formation of WNC has lacked the flexibility required to meet the changing priorities of the council and its community. WNC's new contract will deliver a brand new highways service with fresh priorities and requirements specifically tailored towards the needs of West Northamptonshire residents. Under the new contract with Kier the Council is increasing investment to the service by more than £1million per year, and


will also have greater control, increasing its own resource to manage and monitor performance, which will include clear, strong goals for improving customer focus and providing value for money.

The new contractor has also set its commitment to working with the Council on its sustainability goals to achieve net zero emissions by 2030, as well as increasing social value to the service to benefit the wider West Northants community and economy, such as supporting local disadvantaged groups and working with local sub-contractors.

As the outcome of the process also saw North Northamptonshire Council appoint Kier as their preferred supplier, having the same contractor working on two separate neighbouring highways services will lead to some cost advantages for the two authorities, such as the ability to share some administrative functions and contract management roles. The new contract will run for seven years, with the potential to extend to a maximum of 14 years based on performance and quality of the service.

Preferred candidate announced as Chief Fire Officer

Mark Jones is currently Chief Fire Officer of the South Australian Country Fire Service. His appointment is now subject to confirmation by the Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Panel, which will take place in the next few weeks. The announcement of Mark Jones as preferred candidate follows a



challenging selection process. The candidates took part in two days of activities, where they presented to, and took questions from, senior members of partner organisations, before participating in a 'question time' event with firefighters and staff. The candidates then faced a formal interview panel, from which Stephen Mold has identified his preferred candidate.

Stephen said: "I am delighted to announce that following this testing process, Mark Jones was unanimously the preferred candidate to take over the role of Chief Fire Officer of Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue Service. Mark is an experienced and accomplished Chief Fire Officer and is an ideal choice to take our service forward.

"Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue Service has made great progress since 2019, improving its performance and the way it keeps the people of Northamptonshire safe beyond all recognition. I have no doubt that Mark Jones is the right person to take NFRS forward into the next stage of its development, creating a positive, welcoming culture, embracing change, and taking the undoubted skills of the firefighters and staff to build on the already significant work they do in the broader community safety arena."

"The Police and Crime Panel will now consider whether or not to approve my preferred candidate and I look forward to taking my recommendation to them."

Mark Jones said: "Like all UK emergency services, Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue Service is in a period of evolutionary change and it is an exciting prospect to be part of a team that will continue to deliver topquality safety services to the people of Northamptonshire.

"The Fire Service has achieved much with tight resources over many years and that is testament to the professionalism of the men and women who dedicate themselves to their roles. My current service is fantastic and I know that the people I have met from NFRS show the same commitment, passion and dedication to public safety and public service.

"I would like to thank the Police and Crime Commissioner Stephen Mold and the members of the selection process for giving me the opportunity to lead Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue Service and I would be honoured to serve the people of Northamptonshire," Mark added.

If Mark Jones is confirmed as the next Chief Fire Officer, he will take over the reins when Darren Dovey retires from the post in October this year.

About Mark Jones

Mark joined Grampian Fire Brigade in 1985 and after working in various roles was appointed as Deputy Chief Fire Officer in Essex in 2005, and then became Chief Fire Officer of Buckinghamshire in 2010.

After leaving Buckinghamshire in 2015, Mark moved to Australia and served as the ACT Emergency Services Agency's "Director of Strategic Reform" for two years. He served as the London Ambulance Service's Head of Resilience and Specialist Assets in 2019 before returning to Australia, taking on the role of Chief Officer of the South Australian Country Fire Service. Among his achievements he commanded the largest ever series of bushfires in South Australia's history. Mark has worked in a wide range of senior operational and strategic leadership roles. He has managed large scale emergencies, events and terror related incidents, and his career has spanned roles in emergency planning and disaster management, operational Fire Command, Fire Safety and Training. Mark has shown a particular professional interest in the fields of fairness, equality, and diversity, and these were his key responsibilities as he served as an Inspector in Her Majesty's Fire Service Inspectorate for Scotland in the early 2000s. He also worked on the 'Women in Emergency Services' project in Canberra, which saw a significant increase in the recruitment of women into the ACT's Fire and Rescue Service.

First Human Trafficking charges secured by Northamptonshire Police

Four people, all from the same family, have been sentenced following an investigation into the trafficking of women from Europe into the UK, for the purposes of prostitution. Operation Eton, which was led by the Force's Serious & Organised Crime Team, saw the first modern slavery and human trafficking charges

secured by Northamptonshire Police and involved an organised crime gang making more than £20,000 per month from women they had trafficked into the country.



Jamie Dunn, 42, previously of Irons Road, Lower Harlestone, his father, Martin Dunn, 74, of Compton Street, Northampton, Jamie's partner - Catalina Cojocaru, 37, of Irons Road, Lower Harlestone, and her brother Andrei Cojocaru, 26, of Wellingborough Road, Northampton, were all sentenced this week (June 14) at Northampton Crown Court for their roles in the organised operation, after pleading guilty at an earlier court hearing.

Between November 2015 and January 2017, the group arranged for women to travel from Europe, mostly Romania, to engage in off-street prostitution, firstly in Northampton and then as the business grew, in Nottingham, Birmingham, and other Midlands' locations.

In December 2015, Jamie Dunn placed online adverts on a sex worker website relating to up to 13 women working for the group in order to attract clients. He was also responsible for sourcing the properties that would go on to be used as brothels. Catalina Cojocaru's role was pivotal in the sourcing of women from Europe to travel to the UK as sex workers, and she was the one who would do the day-to-day running of the operations. Police recovered lists and text messages that showed that Catalina acted as the sex workers' 'boss', having daily contact with them and keeping records of the daily takings. Evidence showed that this amount was up to £1,640 per day of which the gang would take 50 per cent from each woman. As the investigation progressed, Andrei Cojocaru was found in possession of 12 mobile phones, seven of which had the names of the sex workers written on the back so that he knew which booking was for which woman. He would engage with clients who thought they were communicating with the advertised women and would then direct the clients to the property.

His role also included topping up mobile phones and collecting the trafficked women from airports. Martin Dunn was the source of the initial finance outlay, having recently come into a large sum of money following a house sale. He also paid for airline tickets for a number of women coming into the UK and would help to collect them from airports. He also financed hotels and serviced apartments used by the sex workers. Following the investigation, Jamie Dunn was charged with two counts of conspiring to arrange or facilitate the travel of another person to the UK with a view to them being exploited, conspiring to control prostitution for gain, and for acquiring criminal property. He was sentenced to a total of four years and nine months in prison. Catalina Cojocaru was charged with two counts of conspiring to arrange or facilitate the travel of another person to the UK with a view to them being exploited and conspiring to control prostitution for gain and she was sentenced to three years and nine months in prison. Andrei Cojocaru was handed one year in prison, suspended for 14 months plus 150 hours of unpaid work, for the offence of conspiring to control prostitution for gain, and Martin Dunn was given a 12-month community order and 100 hours unpaid work for the offence of acquiring criminal property.

Senior Investigating Officer – Detective Inspector Carrie Powers, said: "This was a very complex and lengthy investigation but I am really pleased that through it, we managed to secure the Force's first charges under modern day slavery legislation and to get guilty results for all four offenders. "This organised crime gang exploited vulnerable women with the false promise of a better life in the UK. Instead, they forced them to have sex with a large number of men with no regard for their rights or welfare. "These women worked long hours, only to have a large proportion of their earnings taken by the gang which would then be used to fund luxury lifestyles. "Investigating these sort of cases may be complex but Northamptonshire Police is absolutely committed to tackling modern slavery and bringing the people who exploit vulnerable members of our community to justice."

Modern slavery is the illegal exploitation of people for personal or commercial gain. It covers a wide range of abuse and exploitation. Victims of modern slavery can be any age, gender, nationality and ethnicity. They are tricked or threatened into work and may feel unable to leave or report the crime through fear or intimidation. They may not recognise themselves as a victim. To report a suspicion of modern slavery or to seek advice, you can contact the Modern Slavery Helpline confidentially on 08000 121 700. This is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Progress on the new Northampton Bike Park

Contractor On Track has made great progress on the new Northampton Bike Park as we reach the halfway



point of the build. The £725k project will deliver a range of facilities for all ranges of ability, from a skills area usable by children on balance bikes, right up to the most demanding trails for experts in the sport, all of them free to use. Mountain bike enthusiast and amateur competitor, Tony Skirrow, has been part of the project from the outset and he's very excited by the plans.

"I was really pleased when it was announced that we had the funding for a bike park and while I had an idea of what was needed, this is beyond my wildest dreams," he said.

"This will allow people of all ages and abilities to take

part in the sport and as well as being a fantastic facility for the people who live here, it will be a major draw for the area.

"Mountain bikers currently have to travel around an hour and a half to reach the closest facility but soon they'll have one of the best of its type in the country right on their doorstep." Completion is expected during August and, once complete, the new facility will comprise:

- A multi-user green trail an easy, dual-direction cycle route across the site, connecting Houghton Hill to the underpass for the A45
- Blue (moderate), red (difficult) and black (severe) off-road mountain bike trails for different abilities dual tracks will allow head-to-head riding
- Five gathering spots where riders can meet to discuss the next section of track, and coaching can be provided
- A mountain bike skills area

The total budget is made up of £250,000 from Sport England, on behalf of the Places to Ride programme – a partnership between British Cycling, Sport England and the Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport (DCMS) – with the rest from the council.
