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# **NEWS REPORT JUNE 2023**

### **Monthly Highlights**

Due to more visa applications being approved, further hosts are needed as new arrivals from Ukraine are looking to make West Northamptonshire their temporary home.

Ukrainians in the UK will be helped into their own homes as part of a £150 million funding allocation. Funding can be used by councils to help Ukrainian families into the private rental sector, help them get jobs, and continue sponsorship for guests' second year in the UK. The Department for Transport has also announced it will extend the length of time Ukrainian refugees can drive in Great Britain on their home country driving licence, from 1 year to 3, in a move that will help many continue the lives and jobs they have forged since arriving here.

On Sunday 4th June 2023, Stagecoach East made changes to the 41 service within the Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire network. This has been the result of considerable influence being exerted on Milton Keynes Council by Councillor Deborah Whitworth supported by me and others. The importance of this transport link for the communities who live alongside the A428 between Bedford and Northampton cannot be underestimated. It is a lifeline to those who have no other form of transport. Many of you have spoken out at various events about the need for this important service to be reinstated. Thank you to all of you who have played a part in achieving these changes. So, let's see what we can do to market and encourage an increase in bus patronage along this route so that we can secure it for the foreseeable future.

Kier intends to carry out carriageway resurfacing works along the A428 through Yardley Hastings. To undertake this work safely the road needs to be closed with the initial patching works commencing on the 14 June until the 27 June at off peak times. The closure and diversion can be viewed on one network.

On 13 June 2023, I was extremely disappointed to hear about further flooding in Blacksmiths Way, Hartwell, particularly as I have been working on trying to obtain a resolution to this problem for the past two years. During this time, WNC and Kier have worked on site to carry out some remedial actions on an intermittent basis, but what is needed is a systematic review and an agreed action plan implemented which resolves this matter once and for all. I asked Anna Earnshaw, CEO, WNC to provide me with a statement of WNC's intentions on how they intend to resolve this matter. Previously WNC have undertaken works on Ashton Road to remove the roots from the drain, they have now confirmed they will be revisiting on a regular basis to ensure the drain is kept clear of tree roots. In addition, they have also identified a number of broken gully connections on Ashton Road when recent cabling works were undertaken by a third party. The Street Works supervisor team have been advised to repair them urgently and I am awaiting a confirmed date. As soon as I have a confirmed date, I will advise you accordingly. On Wednesday 14 June 2023 engineers were in the area to clear out the drains in preparation of a CCTV survey to see why the water was not clearing away from the drain near 71 Blacksmith's Way last week. They will complete the survey and then action the findings. I shall be meeting our Network Manager Paul McGrath and Andrew Leighton on Tuesday 27 June at 11.00am to look at the issues first hand. They are currently looking at all options and feasibility and will go through this at our meeting.

Look out for the West Northamptonshire Parks Visitor's Feedback survey which closes on 30 June 2023.

Families with schoolchildren experiencing hardship across West Northamptonshire received a voucher to support them with food costs during the May half-term holiday. Provided by the Department for Work and

Pensions (DWP), West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) will be distributing over £187,000 in vouchers to help up to 12,500 of the most vulnerable families with the ongoing cost of living challenges. WNC's Cabinet met on 13 June 2023 to determine the best use of Household Support Fund 4 within the scope set out by government over the next 9 months, which will support struggling residents and deliver better outcomes as part of its anti-poverty strategy.

West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) is moving its Daventry offices from Lodge Road to the Abbey Centre. The move will take place in two phases. Customer-facing services have now moved, to be followed by the move of the rest of the WNC teams and the Northamptonshire Children's Trust later this summer.

Local assets such as sports clubs, music venues and historical buildings will be able to apply for government funding as part of the third round of the Community Ownership Fund, with £150 million worth of allocations available.

Planning applications across West Northamptonshire will be determined by two new committees from June, as our Council continues work to improve planning services. Since vesting we have operated three Local Area Planning Committees, covering the former Daventry District, South Northamptonshire and Northampton Borough council areas.

Proposals to abolish those committees and replace them with two new committees – one covering the north of West Northants, and one for the south – were agreed at Annual Council on Thursday 19 May. The Strategic Planning committee will remain as it currently is.

The Planning Committee – North will be composed of eleven members and be constituted to deal with planning applications falling within the following wards:

Braunston & Crick, Brixworth, Moulton, Long Buckby, Daventry West, Daventry East, Woodford & Weedon, Duston West & St Crispin, Duston East, Dallington Spencer, Abington & Phippsville, Kingsthorpe North, Kingsthorpe South, Boothville & Parklands, Headlands, Talavera and Billing & Rectory Farm.

The Planning Committee – South will be composed of eleven members and be constituted to deal with planning applications falling within the following wards:

Bugbrooke, Towcester & Roade, Hackleton & Grange Park, Silverstone, Deanshanger, Middleton Cheney, Brackley, St George, Sixfields, East Hunsbury & Shelfleys, Delapre & Rushmere, Castle, Riverside Park and Nene Valley.

At the Annual Meeting of Council, 18 May 2023 I was appointed as Chairman of the West Northamptonshire Council Planning Committee South.

Community Tree Planting Grants are available, and applications can be submitted from June onwards with a final deadline of 15 December 2023. See my Monthly Report.

Stickers promoting the correct use of waste and recycling bins are being distributed to households across West Northamptonshire from this week. The stickers will be placed on top of general waste bins, with clear instructions on what cannot go into that bin:

- No Batteries, use separate collection
- No Food Waste, use your food caddy
- No Recyclables, use your recycling bin

People aged between 70 to 79 in West Northamptonshire are being encouraged to get their shingles vaccine to lower the chance of developing the infection.

A toolkit to help set up Warm Hubs across the country has been launched, with support agencies encouraged to build on this winter's Warm Spaces initiatives and convert them to Warm Hubs.

To help people with cost-of-living pressures and save on everyday travel costs, the government will continue to cap single bus fares at £2 outside London until the end of October 2023 and then at £2.50 until 30 November 2024 – when the government will review their effectiveness and future bus fares.

The Virtual Wellbeing Festival 2023 (VWBF23) is taking place from Monday 3 to Friday 7 July.

Voluntary and community sector organisations who deliver important services in West Northamptonshire can now apply for grants of up to £15,000. West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) opened a fresh round of Discretionary Community Funding Grants from Tuesday, 30 May 2023.

Applications for this round of funding should be submitted no later than Wednesday, 28 June 2023.



# **Reduction of Speed Limit on the A428**




Many of you have written to me expressing your concerns about the numbers of accidents, some fatal that have taken place over the years on the A428 through

Northamptonshire. Over the last two years, I have worked on the need to reduce the speed limit on the A428 from Brackmills to Yardley Hastings. The first hurdle was to provide evidence and then convince members

of the Road Safety Panel of the need for a change to the speed limit on this stretch of road. Agreement was reached last year, and I was advised of the Council's intention to reduce the speed limit between The

Lakes Roundabout, & the Northampton West Northamptonshire Boundary. On 2 March 2023, WNC finally wrote to several interested parties informing them proposals of to introduce а 40mph speed limit Order on Bedford Road, Northampton and а 50mph speed limit on A428 Northampton through Great Road, Houghton, Little Houghton, Brafield on



the Green, Denton, Castle Ashby, and Yardley Hastings. The existing 30 mph stretches through Brafield on the Green and Yardley Hastings remain unchanged. The proposals have been put forward for maintaining safety and have been agreed through the Speed Limit Review Panel.

I have heard from the team that manages the Traffic Regulation Order process and they have advised that both the statutory and public consultations have ended without the receipt of any objections. Our engineers will now draw up and finalise the signing plans and get these works priced and ordered. We anticipate that we will be in a position to install the new signs in approximately 3 months.

Thank you to all those residents who provided evidence of the need to make these changes and supported me with this campaign from the outset.

### **Changes to the 41 Bus Service**

On Sunday 4th June 2023, Stagecoach East made changes to the 41 service within the Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire network. This has been the result of considerable influence being exerted on Milton Keynes Council by Councillor Deborah Whitworth supported by me and others. The importance of this transport link for the communities who live alongside the A428 between Bedford and Northampton cannot be underestimated. It is a lifeline to those who have no other form of transport. Many of you have spoken out at various events about the need for this important service to be reinstated. Thank you to all of you who

have played a part in achieving these changes. Rural areas, like urban areas, should be able to plan bus networks that meet people's needs. If bus patronage is going to grow, the bus user must be prioritised, whether that bus user is in a city or in the countryside. Rural local authorities need to have a range of options for creating high quality networks in their areas including the pooling of existing bus funding.

Rural areas have a lot of different transport services commissioned and run by different bodies: social services, education, health, youth



service etc. If these were brought together, better rural transport services could be provided with no extra cost. I want to see more authorities co-ordinating their transport services and funding, and the Government promoting this through local area agreements.

In the meantime, as Councillor Debbie Whitworth and others say you will need to use the 41 service or it will be lost. So, let's see what we can do to market and encourage an increase in bus patronage along this route so that we can secure it for the foreseeable future.

### Legal position on any predetermination discussions about Planning Applications

As the Chairman of the South Northamptonshire Local Area Planning Committee, I may be involved in the decision making for any subsequent planning application. Section 25 of the Localism Act 2011 provides that a decision maker is not to be taken to have had, or appeared to have had, a closed mind when making the decision just because:

- (a) the decision maker had previously done anything that directly or indirectly indicated what view the decision maker took, or would or might take, in relation to a matter; and
- (b) the matter was relevant to the decision.

This provision does not change the law on bias and pre-determination which means that Committee Members must still take planning decisions with an open mind and having considered all relevant material planning considerations. The safest course is for Committee Members to avoid making public statements (including expressing views in emails) as to their support for or opposition to any application which would indicate they had made up their minds before the formal consideration of the application at the meeting. If a Committee Member has made such a statement, they must be satisfied that they can still consider the application with an open mind and are prepared to consider any new matters or any new arguments in favour of or against the proposed development until the decision is made otherwise, they should not take part in any decision on the application in question.

On the grounds of the above, it would not be appropriate for me to attend Parish Council or Community events which seek to take a decision regarding the outcome of a planning application as I must keep an open mind on this matter so as not to preclude me from participating in any future planning decisions.

# 'The War Painted' by Ukrainian Artists

An exhibition of paintings and film created by Ukrainian artists was on display at the Northampton Museum



and Art Gallery between Saturday 3 and Sunday 18 June.

It is the first time the exhibition, curated by Ukrainian organisation Golden Time Talent and provided in partnership with the Northampton Museum and Art Gallery and Northampton Town Council, will be displayed in the United Kingdom, having previously toured the United Arab Emirates and Europe.

'This War Painted' portrays the stories of a war-torn country from 34 Ukrainian artists' perspectives, almost a year and a half since the Russian invasion of

the country. All paintings were available to purchase and proceeds will go back to the Ukrainian community. Northampton Museum and Art Gallery will host the exhibition in the Central Hall, where 48 paintings will be displayed alongside an accompanying film showing the artists painting in their homeland.

# **Refugee Week**

West Northamptonshire celebrated the 25th anniversary of Refugee Week from 19 June with a number of events to raise awareness of issues affecting asylum seekers and the local support available to them.

Refugee Week is celebrated every year to honour refugees and appreciate the contributions, creativity and resilience of people seeking sanctuary. This year's theme was compassion and people were invited to celebrate 'what compassion looks like' and extend compassion to all after challenges faced in the last few years.

From 19 to 25 June, events took place at the University of Northampton, Northampton Filmhouse and online, with a full programme of speakers and presentations planned at the Guildhall in Northampton on



Thursday, 22 June.

West Northamptonshire Council's (WNC) Diverse Communities Forum hosted the event alongside Town of Sanctuary, from 5pm to 7pm, with stalls from organisations including British Red Cross, DWP and Quakers. There was a short film and a photo exhibition from Learn2Live (L2L) during the event and presentations and stories from refugees that have settled in Northamptonshire.

available to refugees in West Northamptonshire, whose communities have welcomed hundreds of individuals and families fleeing persecution from places including the Ukraine, Afghanistan and Syria.

Recent resettlement schemes have included supporting the arrival and community care needs of nearly 400 Afghan nationals and more than 700 Ukrainian nationals as part of the Afghan Relocation and Homes for Ukraine schemes.

# Further £150 million funding to assist Ukrainians

Ukrainians in the UK will be helped into their own homes as part of a £150 million funding allocation. The funding will be divided across the UK according to the number of Ukrainians in each nation. Funding can be used by councils to help Ukrainian families into the private rental sector, help them get jobs, and continue sponsorship for guests' second year in the UK.

Within England, this funding will be used to help people remain in their current accommodation or find alternative housing, including in the private rented sector. The Homes for Ukraine scheme has welcomed over 124,000 Ukrainians to the UK, with almost half of working-age nationals now in employment and settled into their local areas, having had the right to work, receive benefits and access public services from day one.

The Department for Transport has also announced it will extend the length of time Ukrainian refugees can drive in Great Britain on their home country driving licence, from 1 year to 3, in a move that will help many continue the lives and jobs they have forged since arriving here.

# **FINANCE AND TRANSFORMATION**

## **Cost of Living Support**

Households experiencing hardship will receive over £5m of further financial support from the Government to be shared out in the year ahead by our Council. The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) has allocated £5,199,257 to WNC in the fourth round of its Household Support Fund, which will continue helping the most



vulnerable with the ongoing cost of living challenges. This latest package of support measures got under way over the May half-term holidays, with our Council distributing over £187,000 in school meal vouchers to help up to 12,500 families. We are working with the community and voluntary sector to shape the arrangements, which include plans for:

- Around 12,500 families with children continuing to receive meal vouchers during the school holidays, as well as vouchers for uniforms over the summer
- Health visitors and midwives providing infant formula vouchers to new parents most in need of support to help give their little ones a healthy start
- Voluntary and community groups sharing out £1.2m in the form of £120 vouchers to support vulnerable households
- Over 1,500 households experiencing the most severe hardship receiving a £300 voucher
- £600,000 allocated towards food clubs and larders, with half of the funding to help upscale and improve their use of those facilities in a move towards providing more sustainable ongoing support
- £115,000 earmarked towards helping the most struggling households reduce their energy bills, with a further £110,000 to provide money and debt advice services to those facing severe financial hardship.

We know the impact and challenge that the cost-of-living crisis is continuing to have on residents and we are committed to doing all that we can to provide support. It's essential we meet the needs of our residents in the best way possible and this package of measures has carefully considered how we can maximise the use of the DWP's latest round of funding to achieve this.

Our partners, including schools and local voluntary and community groups play a crucial role in this and we will be working with them to ensure this funding is received by those who need it most. d to look out for further information on the support packages that will be available in the coming weeks.

# Daventry Offices move from Lodge Road to the Abbey Centre



West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) is moving its Daventry offices from Lodge Road to the Abbey Centre to make more efficient use of office space and generate savings as well as improve service quality and to meet the changing needs of our communities.

The move will take place in two phases. Customerfacing services have now moved, to be followed by the move of the rest of the WNC teams and the Northamptonshire Children's Trust later this summer.

The office relocation was informed by feedback from customers and employees about how office space is being used post-Covid. The move will bring together services more effectively for residents. This would include front-line teams like customer services, revenues and benefits, housing, adult social care, and children's services being based within the Abbey Centre in St John's Square. It is expected to save at least £200,000 a year in the Council's revenue budget, which pays for the day-to-day running of services. Residents visiting the Abbey Centre can:

- Get advice about a wide range of West Northants Council services, from housing options to council tax and everything else in between.
- Report issues online, from potholes to concerns about a child or adult, using the website in our selfserve areas.
- Access LibraryPlus services and well as meet with our partners who can help with money advice, legal matters, or offer health and wellbeing support.

The full details of our new Customer Services Hub in Daventry are The Abbey Centre in St John's Square (behind the Leisure Centre), St John's Square, Daventry, NN11 4XG.

Our customer service team alongside other key council services and partner agencies offer a wide range of drop-in options across West Northamptonshire. Find a drop-in session near you on our website.

# **Community Ownership Fund**

Local assets such as sports clubs, music venues and historical buildings will be able to apply for government funding as part of the third round of the Community Ownership Fund, with £150 million worth of allocations available. Thanks to changes to the way the funding is delivered, it is now easier for the control of prized assets to be seized back by community groups.

This will help with the strengthening and levelling up of local communities, whilst also restoring optimism, hope and pride. The changes see the requirements for match-funding being reduced, making the process of acquiring assets without private funding easier.

Parish Councils are also now able to apply for the fund, with it previously only being available to charities and community groups.

More than 100 projects around the country are being supported by the fund

# **Community Tree Planting Grants**

The UK Community Tree Planting Programme aims to support community projects that will:



- Conserve, restore and protect indigenous trees and woodlands, forests, habitats and associated biodiversity.
- Support community engagement in tree planting to promote reforestation and to increase awareness of the importance of trees and forests to environmental and human well-being.
- Encourage social cohesion and inclusion.

To be eligible, your organisation must be community-based e.g. a school, community group or nongovernmental organisation. There are two tiers of funding available:

- Small scale: A maximum of £1,000 is available for projects of up to 1 year in duration. This could be small community woodland, orchards, hedging projects, etc.
- Larger scale: Projects to range from 1000 10,000 trees, with a maximum price equivalent to £1.50/tree (inclusive of tree protection). Most suitable for community woodland or hedging projects.

# HOUSING

# Landlord Fined £115,181

A landlord has been fined a total of £115,181 for offences under the Housing Act 2004, following a number of complaints received.

West Northamptonshire Council's (WNC) Private Sector Housing Team inspected the four properties in March 2020 under a housing warrant after complaints were raised over noise concerns, fly-tipping and waste accumulations. It was found that all four properties were unlicensed houses in multiple occupation and that each had significant defects.

During the sentencing which took place on Thursday 20 April at Northampton Magistrates Court, the District Judge stated



that the tenants were vulnerable and there was reasonable expectation that the landlord would provide a safe home. In this case, without the intervention of the Council nothing would have been done to improve living conditions for the tenants.

The landlord was ordered to pay the following:

- £100,000 fine
- £15,000 contribution to the Council
- £181 statutory victim surcharge

# Voi e-Scooters and e-Bikes Safety Training

Events to help riders use Voi's e-scooters and e-bikes safely are being put on in Northampton. The company has arranged a number of online safety webinars and in-person events from next month onwards. The hour-long webinars cover all aspects of safely riding a Voi e-scooter or e-bike, from wearing a helmet, to the correct position in the road and how to park without causing an

obstruction for pedestrians. Anyone completing one will receive 30 free minutes for use on either a Voi escooter or e-bike. IN person events are also scheduled to take place at the University of Northampton's

Waterside Campus on Saturday 20 May and Saturday 1 July.

Participants get a day pass worth £10, so they can ride for free throughout the session, and an extra 15 minutes of free riding time to practice riding safely afterwards. They also get a free helmet, worth £35.

# **Fly-tipping Wilberforce Street**

A man who dumped five bags of waste on the corner of Wilberforce Street and St Edmunds Road, Northampton has had to pay out £2,055 for fly-tipping.



West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) officers carried out a routine patrol in the area in May 2022, when they came across the large amount of waste carelessly discarded on the street. After carrying out investigation they found items which linked this back to Mr Marian Gheorghe aged 49 of Edith Street, Northampton.

Gheorghe was issued with a fixed penalty notice of £400, which he did not pay. The case was put forward for prosecution where Gheorghe attended court on Tuesday 22 November 2022 and pleaded not guilty.

Following a trial at Northampton Magistrates Court on Wednesday 31 May 2023 Gheorghe was found guilty and

was subsequently fined £1,050, costs amounting to £1,000 and a victim surcharge of £105.

# Stickers Promoting correct use of waste and recycling bins

Stickers promoting the correct use of waste and recycling bins are being distributed to households across West Northamptonshire from 20 June. The stickers support three campaigns which aim to raise awareness of what people can and can't put into their collections, in a bid to reduce contamination in household

collections, improve the quality of our recycling and maintain the safety of crews and residents by ensuring batteries are disposed of correctly.

The stickers will be placed on top of general waste bins, with clear instructions on what cannot go into that bin:

- No Batteries, use separate collection
- No Food Waste, use your food caddy
- No Recyclables, use your recycling bin

From Tuesday 20 June and into July, the stickers will be distributed by crews to every household across West Northants. Everyone will receive these, and we will

be notifying people of this work via social media. Our customer services team are aware of this work and can support with making residents aware.

# **HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE**

# Local Area Partnership DSN4

The last DSN4 LAP meeting took place on 6 June 2023 The date of the next meeting is 4 July 2023.

The West Northants Executive PLACE Board consists of operational leaders from organisations across West Northamptonshire overseeing PLACE development and feeds into the West Northamptonshire Health and Wellbeing Board. Local Area Partnerships (LAPs) in Daventry and South Northants area report into the Daventry and South

Northants Health and Wellbeing Forum. Children and young people, children and young people's mental health and anti-social behaviour are emerging priorities across the LAPs in West Northamptonshire. Rurality, social isolation and older people are also emerging priorities across the four LAPs in the Daventry and South Northants area. Lots of organisations collate data and the PLACE Board meeting earlier the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment was discussed and how this could be used at a LAP level to help identify pockets of need which will also overlap the Local Area Profiles. The PLACE Board held a workshop on the 3rd May to discuss how partners were collating data, what is was used for, how can this be shared. Attendees agreed for a subgroup to be created to look at collaboration and data sharing in more detail. Joanne Barrett, Assistant Director, Housing and Communities has data on the areas with the greatest number of homelessness, and quality of the social housing stock. Sarah Reed, Executive Director Corporate has birth and death data at a LAP level. New mothers or those suffering a bereavement could be sent information on groups/assets within their local area. During the previous year there were approximately 930 births in N4 LAP and 89 in DSN3 LAP. The Outcomes Framework and metrics will be presented to the Integrated Care Partnership meeting on the 8th June for endorsement. Each LAP will have its own webpage.





## **Youth Provision in Towcester**

Northamptonshire Children's Trust (NCT) is commissioned to provide statutory children's social care and targeted early help services across the county. Within NCT there is a Children and Family Support Service, which includes the following:

- Strengthening Family Service, working with families on a wide range of issues.
- Young Peoples Service, supporting adolescent and families with adolescents focusing on exploitation.
- Early Help Partnerships team providing early help support in the community.

The Young Peoples Services have supported 260 young people and families over the past year with an average age of 15 years. 65% of these young people have emerging or actual exploitation concerns. This service also provide support with children who go missing, completing home return interviews for early missing child in Northamptonshire, these interviews are completing within 3 days of a child returning home. In the past year there have been 2433 missing children across Northamptonshire, and had 80% engagement with these children.

Within the Young Peoples Service there is RISE (Reducing Incidents of Sexual Exploitation), a multi-agency group who works with young people who are known to statutory children's services and at a high level risk of exploitation. 23 people were seen by RISE during the previous year, 91% of these saw a significant reduction in the in exploitation following intervention. The Children and Family Support Service also have a group work offer of Parenting, supporting parents who are experiencing challenging behaviour from their adolescents. The Children and Family Support Service are also piloting Teen Freedom at Daventry

for young people who have experienced domestic abuse within their relationships. Agencies also deliver services into children centres such as child parent violence course. A small SEND team also support families where there is a complex need.

Early Help Partnership is consists of organisations who provide early opportunities to help families. Services for youth include:

- Grange Park Youth club
- Pulse Café in Deanshanger
- Bugbrooke, Harpole and Hartwell have youth clubs who are registered with NAYC(Northampton Association of Youth Clubs) who can provide the DBS system, training and provide resources.
- Tove Valley Baptist Youth Club

South Northants youth Club (SNYC) has been set up to support local youth groups and provide provision where there are gaps. They have a new youth officer for Towcester and will provide support to Tove Valley, Bugbrooke and Harpole youth groups. SNYC work with Sponne School for children who are entitled to free school meals 14-16 years to encourage physical and social activities and are hoping to set up a no faith youth club based in Towcester. SNYC are looking to offer street sport activities. Towcester Youth Coffee House has now been taken over by Northamptonshire MIND. There is a need to consider how can we engage with youth people who would not traditionally attend a youth club.

Julie Curtis has asked for a case study on the Brackley Youth Club to see if this can be replicated across other areas of West Northamptonshire. There is a Play and Activities day taking place in Towcester on the 1st June. There is a need to use the data from DSN4 to show where investment is needed and try to influence targeting of resources.

Claire Neilson is working with VCSE organisations providing youth work to have similar systems and qualifications across the county, also looking at existing resources. Asset mapping is being undertaking to look at the assets and services across West Northamptonshire, once completed work will take place with other organisations and town/parish council to include their information on assets and services.

- Katie Rigby to check the duration before a child is reported as missing.
- Jane Carr to find out more information about the provision for the Towcester Youth Coffee House.

# **Elderly Isolation Subgroup**

The aim of this subgroup is to look at how to encourage elderly people to participate in social activities.

There is a nationwide Chatty Café scheme and Emma Parry has 50 registrations who would like to participate in this scheme. This will enable organisations participating to get a toolkit and training. These registrations are being offered to the Welcoming Spaces of which there are 10 in the DSN4 area. Registrations can also be offered to existing cafes such as Waitrose or Bell Plantations. Additional funding could be made available to enable those hosting Chatty Cafes to collate profile data on those attending. Also looking at premises such as bars that could also provide alcoholic refreshments.

A National Lottery project has been completed 'Men into Extra Time' specifically focused on reducing social isolation for men and was ran in conjunction with Brackley Football Club. There is a project evaluation of offering opportunities who may be socially isolated.

Each LAP will have its own engagement plan and this will capture all the information on assets within villages.

Actions:

- Helen Barrett to bring information on the Men into Extra Time' project to be brought to the next meeting.
- Emma Parry to send the list of Welcoming Spaces to the group.

# People Aged 70-79 encouraged to get their shingles vaccine

People aged between 70 to 79 in West Northamptonshire are being encouraged to get their shingles vaccine to lower the chance of developing the infection. Shingles is a painful infection that can cause a headache, high temperature and an itchy rash, often accompanied with a burning, throbbing pain. The rash usually appears on the chest and abdomen (tummy), however any part of the body can be affected, including the face and eyes.

As older adults are more at risk of developing shingles it is important that people above the age of 70 years old get their free shingles vaccine to help lower the chance of catching the infection and reduce the nasty symptoms that can be experienced from it.

Dr Annapurna Sen, Consultant for Health Protection at Public Health West Northamptonshire Council said:



"In Northamptonshire, the number of those who have been vaccinated against shingles has declined, with only around 44% of people eligible having received the vaccine. The symptoms experienced from this infection are severe and can be life changing, therefore the vaccine is important in helping to protect people from this infection and help relieve the symptoms if they do catch it. So, please take the time to protect yourself from this infection.

"If you have not yet taken up the free

vaccine and you are eligible to do so, please do get booked in via your GP or local pharmacy. If you have not yet been contacted that you are eligible, but think you should be please do speak to your GP or pharmacy who will be able to advise you further."

The shingles infection cannot be caught from another person, however someone who has had chickenpox is at higher risk of developing the infection. After having chickenpox, the virus stays in the body but remains inactive. As people age, their immunity weakens which means the body cannot protect itself against infections or disease the same as it did, and as a result the virus can be reactivated later in life, causing shingles.

Most people will recover fully from this virus, but for some they may experience complications for several months or years. If you are over the age of 70 and have not yet had your vaccine, please contact your GP or your local pharmacy to discuss how you can arrange to get protected.

# Warm Hubs Tool Kit

A toolkit to help set up Warm Hubs across the country has been launched, with support agencies encouraged to build on this winter's Warm Spaces initiatives and convert them to Warm Hubs.

Warm Hubs were originally created by Community Action Northumberland (CAN) in 2015 as places within the local community where people can be assured of finding a safe, warm and friendly environment in which to enjoy refreshments, social activity, advice and the company of other people. Funding for the scheme was provided by Northern Gas Networks (NGN).



However Warm Hubs are much more than a warm space. They are warm, resilient, sustainable, energy efficient buildings/emergency centres often using renewable technology. The Warm Hub volunteers are fully trained in skills such as first aid, food safety, energy advice and dementia awareness. Finally, every Warm Hub is tailored to meet the needs of its local community, including identifying any gaps in support.

During the last year, CAN was inundated with enquiries from charities and local authorities wanting to set up a Warm Hubs scheme in their own areas as the energy crisis hit. Warm Hubs is trademarked, so to help address the need and to share good practice, CAN created the Warm Hubs toolkit at <u>www.warmhubs.com</u> thanks to support from Northern Gas Networks.

The website describes how to set up and run a Warm Hub scheme, aimed at support agencies across the UK such as local authorities and rural charities. It provides training via a free toolkit of guidance to ensure the Warm Hubs they'll be supporting are meeting the Warm Hub principles.

There are now 42 Hubs across rural Northumberland used by thousands of people each week. The scheme has won various awards and been highlighted as good practice by Ofgem and the Prince's Countryside Fund.

# EDUCATION & CHILDREN'S SERVICES



### Major Step Forward with SEND School near Towcester

Plans for a new purpose-built school near Towcester to create at least 230 new places for youngsters with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) have taken another major step forward this week.

With Department for Education backing, West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) has now successfully entered into a lease agreement with trustees of the St John Tiffield Trust, who own the land, for the use of the proposed site. The Council has been involved in providing education and care on the site for many years, and the new lease arrangement will ensure a successful expansion of the education provision on



offer.

The new special school will provide places for children age 4 to 19 on the autistic spectrum continuum, with speech, language and communication needs and with severe learning difficulties. The new school will be run by the Greenwood Academies Trust and delivered under

the Department for Education Free school presumption process.

In addition to the build of a new special school, the lease will also allow for the extension of the Gateway school, with plans to add up to 50 new places for students with social, emotional and mental health (SEMH) needs. Gateway school is part of the Creating Tomorrow Trust.

Entering the lease agreement is the latest step towards progressing proposals for the new special school, with the next stages set to include seeking planning permission and consulting local residents on the future application as well as moving forward with design development and any future site surveys required. The Council is continuing to work closely with partners and Tiffield Parish Council to provide regular updates on developments and works underway.

This report recognises the work happening by Northamptonshire's Independent Fostering Agency, and some of the key actions in development to improve experiences and outcomes for foster parents in the county and our children and young people.

It is encouraging to see the work underway, and even though it is too early to see the desired impact of these changes, it is assuring that progress is being made against both the compliance notices and recommendations.



We are continuing to work closely with Northamptonshire Children's Trust to embed improvements and build on progress to ensure our children and young people have access to the best support and opportunities.

# South Northants Youth Engagement (SNYE)

A charity which supports young people in the Brackley, Towcester and Kings Sutton areas is going from strength-to-strength with support from local partners.

More than 1,000 young people and their families benefit from the events put on by South Northants Youth Engagement (SNYE), including two regular youth clubs at Brackley Leisure Centre and Southfields School



and a range of community play and activity days. Most of the events are free or cost no more than £2 per session to cover costs, but are proving invaluable in helping local children build their confidence and skills.

The charity is supported by a range of organisations, including West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) and both Brackley and Towcester Town Councils.

Councillors Sue Sharps, Fiona Baker and Tony Bagot-Webb sit on both councils and between them supported SNYE with £2,000 of funding

from their Councillor Covid Support Funds. Cllr Sharps is also a trustee of the charity, alongside Towcester Town Councillor Martin Johns.

Brackley Town Council recently funded training for SNYE staff to allow them to put on popular skateboarding sessions for children ahead of the installation of a new skate ramp in the town.

And SNYE also works with Northamptonshire Sport, Sponne School and Towcester Leisure Centre to run regular sports sessions for young people, with plans for a youth club in the town once a suitable venue is found.

The charity this year appointed two new youth workers to work in Brackley and Towcester, but is always in need of new volunteers to help them support more children in the area.

# **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & GRANT FUNDING**

### £5.4million funding from the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF)

New cycleways will be created and local businesses and voluntary organisations are set to benefit from



more than £5.4million funding from the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF). The funding is the largest allocation in the South East Midlands and will be used to create pride in place, improve people's life chances, increase skills, create stronger communities and support local businesses over the next 2 years. Our plans for the funding include creating new and improved pedestrian crossing facilities between the Billing Road and Abington, in Northampton, and improving paths

and cycleways to encourage active travel. The funding will also be used to tackle fuel poverty and the cost of living through the provision of a range of services across West Northants, including improving Household Energy performance in people's homes.

Local voluntary and community organisations will also receive a portion of the money to help increase engagement in community centres and improve the support available to residents.

A range of initiatives, including a new grants programme to help local businesses at all stages to start, sustain, grow and innovate and tailored employment support to help people into work, will also receive some of the funding.

Other areas planned to benefit include:

- Funding for volunteer and social action projects
- Decarbonisation and improving the natural environment

• Business support to enable employers to better utilise the local workforce and understand the advantages of being flexible in terms of recruitment.

We have worked closely with stakeholders, community groups and local partners to analyse the greatest needs for this funding, and most importantly, to deliver economic prosperity in our area whilst supporting sustainability, increasing employment opportunities and offering greater support for local businesses.

### Plans to improve car parking at Northampton Railway Station

Plans to increase spaces and provide improved facilities at Northampton Railway Station, by building a new 1,198 space multi-storey car park (MSCP), have moved forward as West Northamptonshire Council (WNC)



approved proposals at the cabinet meeting on Tuesday, 13 June.

WNC is working closely with Network Rail and its development partner, BlocWork to bring forward the new MSCP which will provide much-needed parking in this area increasing capacity from 800 to 1200.

Following cabinet's approval in December 2021, plans have altered while the Council has responded to lasting impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, war in Ukraine, and cost inflation. As

such, the terms of the lease were not agreed. Therefore, the Council stepped in to deliver proposals which will see the Council manage the facility offering best value for money for residents.

### **New Round of Discretionary Community Funding Grants**



# **Refurbishment of 78 Derngate**

Visitors to Northampton's iconic and historic 78 Derngate can now visit the heritage house and its expanded visitor centre, spend time in the rejuvenated secluded garden and enjoy the revitalised visitor shop following the completion of the extensive £950,000 refurbishment this month.

As the only building located outside Scotland designed by renowned artist, Charles Rennie Mackintosh this local gem and former home is a now a museum. Following funding from West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) of £400,000 through the Town Funds, £200,000 match funding from WNC and generous donations from a multitude of individuals and organisations the expansion to this cultural facility reached completion in May this year, following more than 12 months of regeneration work.

The site now boasts an extension to the main buildings and enhanced gardens, allowing larger groups to visit and enjoy the museum, as well as benefit from an enriched visitor experience at one of Northampton's



most popular attractions.

This is an internationally significant venue. 78 Derngate attracts visitors from all over the world to see the outstanding design work of Charles Rennie Mackintosh, one of our country's most famous influences on early 20th Century style. The house, remodelled by Mackintosh, is unique and it is fantastic to see the empathetic redevelopment works come to life to enhance the museum and enable the 78 Derngate Trust to build its income to become more sustainable for the future.

Northampton Town Centre is going through extensive transformation over the next decade, with the appearance of Fish St and Abington St being sympathetically enhanced to match the neighbouring St Giles St area, and a new heritage park being introduced in Marefair offering community facilities and dedicated green space. The gateway to the town from the Railway Station and main roads will be transformed to offer grade A offices, high-quality homes and a hotel as the expansive 5-acre Four Waterside is regenerated.

### **New Towcester Car Parking Facility**

Following seven months of extensive redevelopment works to transform a former derelict supermarket in Towcester into a new parking facility for the town, Sponne Arcade Car Park officially opened to the public on 10 June.



The former Co-op and Poundstretcher building in the Sponne Arcade located in the heart of the town stood empty for four years prior to the construction of the expanded parking facility.

Over the last year our Council has worked with Jeakins Weir to demolish the derelict stores, level out the area to provide a high-quality central parking facility and expand the site from 70 to 150 formal spaces. This more than doubles the parking space in the town centre and has provided improved lighting and safety features for visitors to the area.

We would like to thank everyone who has been involved in the project and in bringing the vision to life.

The businesses nearby have provided invaluable support throughout the construction, and we'd like to formally thank them for their patience throughout this time. The conclusion of this project is also testament to the hard work of members and officers at the previous South Northamptonshire Council. The £850,000 project has been funded by the council and was completed within budget.

## Third Round of the Community Ownership Fund Launched

DLUHC has launched the third round of its £150 million Community Ownership Fund. Applications to bid

for round three of the funding will open on 31 May. Changes to the fund will make it easier for voluntary and community groups to apply for funding to acquire important assets and run them for the benefit of the local community.

A summary of the key changes to the eligibility requirements for the relaunch of the fund include:

- Reducing the match funding requirement
- Increasing the amount of funding all projects can bid for from £250,000 to £1 million



 Allowing parish councils (and their equivalent town and community councils) to apply in the same way that community groups do currently

The government is providing funding over four years to support community groups to take ownership of assets and amenities at risk of being lost such as community centres, parks, pubs and post office buildings. ### A New Energy Discount Scheme for Businesses, Charities, and the Public Sector

A new energy scheme for businesses, charities, and the public sector has been confirmed, ahead of the current scheme ending in March. The new scheme will mean all eligible UK businesses and other non-domestic energy users will receive a discount on high energy bills until 31 March 2024. This will help businesses locked into contracts signed before recent substantial falls in the wholesale price manage their



costs and provide others with reassurance against the risk of prices rising again.

The new scheme therefore strikes a balance between supporting businesses over the next 12 months and limiting taxpayer's exposure to volatile energy markets, with a cap set at £5.5 billion. This provides long term certainty for businesses and reflects how the scale of the

challenge has changed since September last year.

# Roadworks are starting

### in your area soon

#### What's happening, where and when?

What: Pre-Surface Dressing Carriageway patching - We are carrying out minor resurfacing works in this area in preparation for enabling further works this summer. These future works will involve surface dressing, which is a cost-effective road surface treatment used to prolong the life of roads that are starting to show the first signs of minor deterioration. It extends the life of the road surface, increases skid resistance, and seals the surface to stop water ingress, protecting it from damage caused by severe winter weather, such as potholes. Prior to surface dressing, carriageway patching will be undertaken to address any minor issues to prepare the road for the dressing. You will receive a further factsheet this summer with more details on the next phase of surface dressing.

Where: Bedford Road, Yardley Hastings (12th – 22nd June 2023) & Bedford Road, Denton (23rd & 26th June 2023)

When: Monday 12th June 2023– Monday 26th June 2023. (Weekday working only)

Traffic Management. A diversion will be in place between 20:00 – 06:00 as shown on the map overleaf. The RED line shows the road closure, and the BLUE line shows the diversion route.

How long: 11 days, 20:00 - 06:00. (Road will be accessible as normal outside of working hours.)

Traffic Management: The road will be closed to through traffic on Bedford Road between Yardley Hastings & the A509 roundabout for 9 days starting on the 12<sup>th</sup> June 2023, and closed between Brafield on the Green and Denton for an additional 2 days on the 23<sup>rd</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup> June. A diversion will be installed during the work hours as shown on the maps below.

Emergency Vehicles: Access will be maintained where possible. However, prolonged delays are to be expected.

Residents/Businesses: Access for residents only will be maintained where possible. Our Traffic Management marshals will escort residents through the closure. Please expect delays and plan your journeys accordingly. We will have access signs installed in front of driveways. If you require access, please call the number and our TM foreman will get someone to assist you. Where possible, please park outside of the closure. Access for pedestrians will be maintained where possible, but there will be no access for cyclists.

Public Transport: There will be no bus services through these closures during the working hours.

Parking: To help us with our work, please move any vehicles parked within this section of the road before 20:00. This is to enable our workforce to be able to carry out the works swiftly, without delay. We also ask that you park leaving a minimum of 20 metres of any junction for the duration of the works. Advanced 'No Parking' warning signs will be placed in the area 24 hours before. Thank you for your understanding, patience, and co-operation.

### **Active Travel Grant Funding**

West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) has been awarded £642,871 funding from Active Travel England to roll-out a new traffic free route in Northampton.

The 1,300-metre route will provide an accessible route through Delapré Park to link Far Cotton with Brackmills, and will encourage walking, wheeling, and cycling whilst providing a missing link between these areas. A planning application showing the routes in Delapré Park has previously been submitted.

The funding will also provide covered cycle parking, wayfinding and information boards in the area and support the social



prescribing and cycling hub project, which aims to promote mental and physical wellbeing, based at Delapré Abbey.

The route is set to be delivered by March 2024 and forms part of the Active Quarter, a collaborative partnership of key public, third sector and private stakeholders who have come together around a shared ambition to pioneer active travel in the south-west area of Northampton.

The Active Quarter's vision is to create accessible routes and projects in the southwest area of the town to promote active travel and encompass Midsummer Meadow, Beckets Park, Delapré Abbey, Delapré Park Golf Centre, the University of Northampton, Brackmills and the neighbouring Pocket Parks.

Progress has been achieved already with the delivery of projects such as the award-winning Northampton Mountain Bike Park, wheelchair accessible angling platforms around the Nene Valley water-skiing lake, and a partnership between the University of Northampton (UON) and Public Health West Northants to develop Waterside as an 'Active Campus' for staff and students.

The Delapré Active Travel route will cater to individuals walking, running and users of all types of wheels, including wheelchairs, pushchairs, and bicycles during all seasons. By designing an inclusive route, we are ensuring that everyone can benefit from this traffic free route connecting nature, heritage, education, and employment.

## Angel Street Closed until mid-end September 2023

Angel St in Northampton remains closed to cars while redevelopment works take place to create a new cultural space at 24 Guildhall Road with NN Contemporary Art. This closure is expected to end mid-Sept. Pedestrian access has been maintained and local businesses continue to trade as usual.

### £2.86m Investment into Road Network across Area

Road users across West Northamptonshire are set to benefit from an additional £2.86 million investment

into the road network across the area. West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) is investing an additional £1 million for 2023/24 into our roads. The Council is also looking to invest in new technologies to help maintain the roads it is responsible for more efficiently and to a better standard. In addition to the Council's additional investment, WNC has been awarded £1.86 million from the Government to boost the planned improvements for the year ahead.

As part of the new Highways contract which

kick-started in September 2022, WNC is working with Kier to deliver a multi-million-pound plan to maintain our road network through the Community Enhancement Plan. This work has reached over 161 parishes, clearing nearly 4km of vegetation and cleaning more than 1,500 road signs to date. Alongside this, Kier has also rectified over 1,688 road and footpath defects, and 6,771 carriageway repairs.

As part of the new contract, Kier set out their commitment to working with WNC on sustainability goals to achieve net zero emissions by 2030, as well as increasing social value to benefit the wider West Northants

community and economy, such as supporting local disadvantaged groups and working with local sub-contractors.

### **Bus Fare Cap Extended until end of October**

On Wednesday, as part of the Help for Households support, the government announced that they are





extending discounted bus travel. To help people with cost-of-living pressures and save on everyday travel costs, the government will continue to cap single bus fares at £2 outside London until the end of October 2023 and then at £2.50 until 30 November 2024 –when the government will review their effectiveness and future bus fares.

The government has published a list of bus companies and bus routes included in the £2 bus fare cap scheme. The government also announced £160 million will be provided to local transport authorities to improve fares, services and infrastructure while £140 million will go to operators to help protect essential services across England

## **Community Transport Grants**

Through this new grant programme Motability aim to help charities and organisations to make an

immediate impact for disabled people, by awarding funding to develop, expand and improve community transport options. The programme is focussed on:

- Funding support for staff or volunteer training and costs.
- Funding to increase the number of vehicles available in the community to help organisations support disabled people.
- Funding local, regional, or national initiatives to • increase awareness of community transport and influence its inclusion in transport strategy and policy.



Funding to schemes, programmes and initiatives that already exist, and who provide best practice solutions, but need further support to remain operational or scale up the service they can provide to help more disabled people.

Charities and organisations working in the community transport sector can apply for grants from £100,000 to £4 million at any point over the next three years until March 2025.

### **Bleed Control Kits**

Kits holding life-saving equipment to help control traumatic bleeding have been rolled out for the first time to public places in South Northants and the Daventry area. The rollout is thanks to a partnership between group Off the Streets campaigning NN and Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner Stephen Mold, who has funded 14 kits to be located in an area spreading from Brixworth to Brackley.



The new bleed control kits are in shops and other venues that will be shown by a window sticker and have items that are used to stop catastrophic bleeding and support an injured person until the emergency services arrive.

Work by Off the Streets NN that has already seen more than 120 bleed cabinets and kits installed around the county, and hundreds of people trained in life-saving skills. These 14 new kits are the first available for public use that have been rolled out in South Northants and Daventry.

Off the Streets NN set up the scheme to tackle knife and gang-related crime through a partnership approach, involving community bodies ranging from educational establishments to faith-based organisations and voluntary agencies.

### **Community Safety Partnership 2023/2024 Strategy**

Northamptonshire The West Community Safety Partnership (CSP) has launched its 2023/24 strategy reinforcing its commitment to make West Northamptonshire a safer place for residents and visitors by taking a partnership approach to reducing crime, serious violence, and anti-social behaviour. The responsible partners for the CSP include West Northamptonshire Council (WNC), Northamptonshire Police, Northamptonshire Probation Trust, Northamptonshire Integrated Care Board and Northamptonshire Fire Service.



The strategy has been co-produced with members of the community, elected members and the Voluntary and Charity Sector to help refresh the priorities for the partnership. The current volume of crime and community concern, and impact on communities and victims were also taken into consideration. Key priorities of the strategy include:

- Working with communities to ensure our neighbourhoods are safe spaces for everyone
- Targeting those causing the greatest harm and tackling the causes of crime through prevention and early intervention
- Reducing incidents of serious violence including domestic abuse, sexual offences and knife crime
- Protecting vulnerable people and safeguarding those at risk of exploitation

To ensure it is accessible for all, the strategy has avoided using a multiple page document and is instead laid out in sections on the CSP webpage. The webpage will feature quarterly live updates to reflect how the CSP has delivered against its key priorities. As part of the strategy, partners have a commitment to deliver the Serious Violence Duty in accordance with the Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Act 2022, which is intended to ensure relevant services work together to share information and collaborate on interventions to prevent and reduce serious crimes within their local communities.

These services include:

- Police
- Justice
- Fire and Rescue Authorities
- Health
- Local Authorities

The specified services have a collective responsibility under the Act to assess serious violence in their local area and produce and implement a delivery plan to address this by January 2024. Funding attached to the delivery of the Duty will be allocated to the Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner (PFCC) and distributed by the responsible authorities.

Projects already delivered by the CSP include providing a critical response to incidents of knife crime and supporting Police with knife amnesty events, working with youth providers such as Free2talk to offer mentoring and support to young people involved in gangs and knife crime, and the launch of an animation for young people highlighting key community safety subjects including fire and water safety, child exploitation and online safety. In addition, the CSP partners between them secured Safer Streets funding

of more than £1.7 million, which enabled projects, programmes and physical improvements, including installing 'Help Points' on the Racecourse and Becket's Park as part of 'safer routes' in Northampton town centre, reinstating CCTV cameras across Northampton, improving street lighting, and alleygating anti-social behaviour hotspots.

Partners have also worked together to deliver more than 60 community engagement events, bringing communities together and celebrating diversity, including Srebrenica, International Youth Day, International Women's Day, Northampton Pride, Diwali and Stephen Lawrence Day, and support campaigns including 16 Days of Activism, Serious Organised Crime week of action, Operation Revive and the launch of the Flare app.

## Northamptonshire Police Cracking down on irresponsible HGV drivers

Northamptonshire Police was back on-board National Highways' unmarked HGV earlier this month (June) as part of the latest operation to crackdown on illegal and irresponsible drivers using the county's major



road network.

Officers from the Safer Roads Team, supported by colleagues from the Roads Policing Team and Special Constabulary, used the vehicle to patrol the county's stretch of the M1 to spot drivers putting others at risk by their poor driving behaviour. The patrols were carried out between Tuesday, May 30, and Friday, June 2, as part of National Highways' Operation Tramline campaign which aims to reduce fatalities and serious injuries on the UK's major routes.

During the four days of action, officers used the HGV super cab to film evidence of unsafe

driving behaviour by pulling alongside vehicles. Drivers seen committing an offence were then pulled over by a police car following a short distance behind.

In total 187 traffic offences were detected with more than half involving the fatal five driving offences, which are the main contributors in collisions, with 85 drivers and passengers stopped for not wearing a seat belt. A further 51 drivers were found to be using a mobile phone while behind the wheel, 14 were reported for driving without due care or reasonable consideration to other road users another five were driving at excess speed.

However, one disqualified driver may have regretted not wearing his seatbelt and using his mobile phone after he was spotted and stopped by officers on the southbound carriageway of the M1 on Wednesday, May 31. The 34-year-old from Warrington not only had his yellow Mercedes HGV seized but he was arrested and subsequently charged with four offences - driving while disqualified, driving with no insurance, driving while using a mobile phone and not wearing a seat belt.

Eriks Teivans of Rylands Drive in Fairfield and Howley, was released on unconditional bail until his first appearance at Northampton Magistrates' Court next Thursday (June 15).

While a 21-year-old Sebastian Bone of Leicestershire, was charged with possession with intent to supply Class B drug, after a black Nissan Micra was stopped on the northbound carriageway near junction 18 on Tuesday, May 30.

He appeared before Northampton Magistrates' Court last Thursday (June 1), where he was released on conditional bail until Thursday, July 13, when he will appear before Northampton Crown Court. In addition to the fatal five offences, 14 drivers were stopped for having illegal window tints, number plates and no valid MOT, nine had insecure, dangerous loads and three people were driving without insurance. PC Dave Lee, of the Northamptonshire Police Safer Roads Team, said: "Reducing the number of people who are killed and seriously injured on our roads remains our priority and to hold a driving licence is both a privilege and a responsibility.

"Some commercial drivers travel thousands of miles each year in the UK and across Europe and are sadly more likely to see the tragic consequences of poor driving standards, so it is always disappointing to still catch a small minority breaking the law.

"It was particularly disappointing to find so many drivers prepared to not only put their own lives at risk but also those of others to check messages, send texts or watch online content on their mobile phones.

"Nothing is so important that it can't wait and certainly checking your mobile while driving is not worth risking not getting home safely. Driving needs your full attention, so please take responsibility for your personal safety on the roads and hang up."

National Highways Assistant Regional Safety Co-ordinator, Marie Biddulph, said: "Through the use of our unmarked HGV cabs, we hope to persuade that small minority of motorists who continue to put themselves and others at risk to think again about their driving behaviour. So, it disappointing to see the number of traffic offences that were spotted during this operation on the M1.

"However, unsafe drivers should be aware that, thanks to the elevated position in the HGV, police officers can see exactly what they are doing, whatever vehicle they are travelling in. Hopefully, this will encourage them to rethink their behaviour and help keep our roads as safe as they can possibly be."

Tragically in 2022, after being involved in a road collision in Northamptonshire, 36 people never returned home safely to their loved ones, and 347 required urgent medical assistance for serious and life-changing injuries.

# Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III and Her Majesty Queen Camilla

Thousands of people came together to enjoy a bank holiday weekend of events and activities as communities across West Northamptonshire celebrated the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III and Her Majesty Queen Camilla.

On Saturday hundreds of people braved the rain for the Community Festival street party in Northampton



town centre, with the celebrations continuing in the sunshine on Sunday as over 6,000 people flocked to the Coronation Big Lunch and After Party in the grounds of Northampton's historic Delapré Abbey to enjoy a range of live music, performances, activities and stalls. Visitors to the free event were treated to a variety of local performances including StyleStars and Dance with a Difference, Northampton's Pauline Quirke Academy, Similar Jones, Old Savoy Jazz Band, Rock Choir, Djin-Li, Britain's Got Talent semi-finalists Born To Perform and Lucien

Moon, who appeared on The X-Factor in 2015 and is opening up for the legendary boy band Westlife later this summer – all topped off with a live broadcast of the National Coronation Concert on the big screen. Coronation events also took place at towns and villages across West Northamptonshire, with over 70 street closures taking place as neighbourhoods gathered to stage their own street parties. The weekend concluded with the Big Help Out on bank holiday Monday, where people across the country joined over 1,500 charities to take part in voluntary work to highlight the impact of volunteering on local communities. To celebrate Local and Community History Month in May, people are invited to join Northampton Central Library to learn about the rich heritage and history of West Northamptonshire.


